


Artificial Flooding


 Artificial flooding is defined by the Water Resources
 Administration Act as a period when regulated flows exceed unregulated flows (must exceed bankfull capacity)



Artificial Flooding

- Key considerations for artificial flooding:
 - Flooding in the Assiniboine River Valley is not always artificial flooding
 - Is often an incremental portion of the flooding
 - Cannot visualize the effects on the ground
 - Technical calculation comparing the unregulated hydrograph and regulated hydrograph





Office of Auditor General Recommendations

Review existing policies and practices to determine what skills and experience levels are required to perform inspections and evaluate claims

Create program guidelines that clearly state what inspectors should be required to document.

Produce and follow a communication strategy to ensure key stakeholders are aware of the Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program and how it operates.

Place time limits on releasing artificial flood reports, decision letters on applicants' Intent to Claim Forms, inspections, payments



What We Heard in 2022

Artificial Flooding

- Disagreement with the definition used by Manitoba
- Compensation for all flooding
- Length of time to announce program

Inspections

- Lack of experience
- Incomplete documentation of damage

Program Application

- Volume of paperwork
- Lack of clarity on damage documentation

Evaluation of Impacts & Compensation

- Lack of consistency
- Lack of timely payments



Manitoba EMO took this feedback into consideration and updated the compensation program process to improve claimant experience while still addressing the OAG recommendations



Regulatory Amendments

- Proposed amendments to two regulations dealing with compensation for artificial flooding:
 - Shellmouth Dam Compensation Regulation under The Water Resources Administration Act.
 - Floodway Compensation Regulation under The Red River Floodway Act.



Shellmouth Dam

- Overhaul of how the Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program is initiated and delivered to prevent delays under current program:
 - Streamlining program initiation (not dependent on artificial flood report)
 - Enabling claims to be filed as soon as a program is commenced
 - MTI to publish inundation maps showing the maximum extent of flooding
 - Allowing for inspections to occur closer to the time when artificial flooding occurs
 - Allowing EMO to determine the compensation to be awarded to claimants based on the proportion of damage or loss attributable to artificial flooding
 - Removing the requirement to use licensed insurance adjusters, EMO to determine inspector qualifications

Red River Floodway

- Minor proposed amendment:
 - Remove the requirement for EMO to use licensed insurance adjusters







Regulation – Next Steps

- Regulatory amendments and related engagement material is currently available online for feedback on EngageMB for 45 days
- Feedback will be accepted until April 14, 2024
- Final amendments to come into force spring 2024







Recommendation One

Review existing policies and practices to determine what skills and experience levels are required to perform inspections and evaluate claims

- Inspections will be carried out by Manitoba Agriculture Services Corporation (MASC).
 - Requires regulatory amendment
- Information collected by MASC Inspectors will be used to assess total flood damages.
- Secondary inspections with a private licensed adjustor can be carried out for structural/property damages.







Recommendation Two

Place time limits on:

- Release of Artificial Flood Reports
- **Decision Letters on Applicants' Intent to Claim Forms**
- **Inspections**
- **Payments**

- Start of a compensation program will no longer be based on the release of the artificial flood report
 - Requires regulatory amendment
- Developed internal timelines for all program components.
- Hired permanent Compensation Program Manager






Recommendation Three

Create program guidelines which clearly state what inspectors should be required to document.

If physical inspections are required, the files should contain the date inspections took place, if the claimant was present, and the nature of the damage.

Produce guidelines that clearly state what must be included in EMO compensation files.

- Developed additional information for the EMO website that will thoroughly explain the compensation program and claimant requirements
 - Informed by new process in regulatory amendments
- Developing animated video of Shellmouth Dam operations and artificial flooding for public education
- Future program files will be tracked & stored in the database used for Disaster Financial Assistance to ensure efficiency

Additional Data

- Feedback from 2022 engagement session:
 - Support additional data (aerial imagery)
 - Concerns that outdated LiDAR data was used
- Updated program will use:
 - Most recent LiDAR, bathymetric, and shoreline data
 - Aerial photography captured at critical timeframes of the artificial flooding period
 - Real-time data from hydrometric stations




Program Initiation

- Artificial flooding commences and property damage or economic loss occurs
- Minister issues public notice that a Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program is open, and claims may be filed:
 - Public notice with the start date of artificial flooding
 - How to apply
 - Link to inundation maps to verify eligibility
 - Public notice with the end date of artificial flooding



Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Flood Damages and Application



Eligible applicants apply using an online application form

The regulation allows claimants to submit a claim for compensation up to 20 days after the period of artificial flooding ends

Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Application Screening



- The Program Manager reviews the types of losses to ensure that required information has been provided
- Hydrologic Forecasting & Water Management (HFWM) verifies the property location is within the artificial flood extent
- Acceptance letter and other forms sent to the claimant
- Program Manager assigns application to MASC for inspection
- Claimant is notified that their application has been assigned to MASC for inspection













Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Inspections



- MASC to initiate contact with the claimant within **5 days**
- Inspections to be scheduled in consultation with the claimant and completed within one month (30 days) of water recession
- MASC will provide EMO with the inspection report within 5 days of inspection completion.
- A secondary inspection by a private adjuster may be required due to the presence of nonagricultural damages. A secondary inspection would be scheduled within 30 days of EMO's receipt of MASC inspection report.
- Manitoba EMO will share the inspection report with the claimant for verification within **60 days** of receipt.











Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Evaluations



The assessment of total flood damages will then be evaluated for the artificial impact. Only damages caused in full or part by artificial flooding are eligible for compensation

A simplified approach will be used to calculate the impact of unproportioned artificial flood damages:

- Previously, evaluation was lengthily as each individual parcel was assessed for the artificial flooding impact based on an inundation map.
- HFWM will now determine an average proportion of artificial flood damages for different stretches of the river
- This process is intended to balance technical interpretation, program timeliness, and fairness between similar claimants.







Evaluation Approach

The Manitoba government will categorize reported losses and create a compensation matrix based on the following three categories:

Paid at 100%


Completely caused by artificial flooding

Paid at average %

Indeterminate cause (natural and artificial flooding)

Paid at 0%

Not caused by artificial flooding



Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Claimant Review



You will receive a compensation statement package for your review and acceptance. This compensation statement package is an explanation of the total compensation offered by Manitoba for damages caused by artificial flooding on your property.

The compensation amount is based on the damages recorded by:

- MASC inspections,
- secondary inspections,
- flood information provided by MTI,
- Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program policies and guidelines.



Claimants are encouraged to reach out to the Program Manager to discuss any questions on specific components of the compensation package.



You may choose to accept only part of your compensation package. You may choose to appeal parts of your compensation package that you do not accept.

Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Claimant Action - Accepts



You will receive a compensation statement package for your review and acceptance. This compensation statement package

is an explanation of the total compensation offered by Manitoba for damages caused by artificial flooding on your property.

Claimants are encouraged to reach out to the Program Manager to discuss any questions on specific components of the compensation package.

If the compensation statement package is accepted by the claimant, then the compensation payment will be processed and provided to the claimant. You can accept all or parts of your compensation statement package, any parts not accepted can be appealed.



Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Claimant Action – Requests Extension



You will receive a compensation statement package for your review and acceptance. This compensation statement package

is an explanation of the total compensation offered by Manitoba for damages caused by artificial flooding on your property.

Claimants are encouraged to reach out to the Program Manager to discuss any questions on specific components of the compensation package.

The regulation requires the claimant to respond within 30 days of receiving the compensation statement package. You may request an additional thirty-day extension to respond by contacting the Program Manager.



Shellmouth Dam Compensation Program Claimant Action – Appeal



If you are not satisfied with the level of compensation provided, you may appeal to the Disaster Assistance Appeal Board. Your appeal must be filed within 90 days of the compensation statement being issued.

The board is required to hear information presented by the claimant and Manitoba EMO before deciding on the appeal. All decisions must adhere to the compensation requirements outlined in sections 12.1 to 12.6 of the Water Resources Administration Act. The board will decide if the claimant's appeal should be either:

- Accepted in part (change in compensation amounts)
- Completely accepted (change in compensation amounts)
- Dismissed (no change in compensation amounts)

A decision of the board may be appealed upon a question of law to The Court of Appeal with leave granted by a judge of that court.
